The program is based at The University of Toledo Medical Center and also includes rotations at St. Luke's Hospital, an independent community hospital less than 10 miles from the medical center. Both institutions serve diverse and complementary patient populations with adequate learning opportunities to see a wide breadth of disease and trauma presentations, and ample opportunities for leadership, patient management, teaching, and procedural skills.

We have on faculty some of the nation's renowned experts in disaster preparedness, a focus that is interwoven throughout the three-year program. Residents will gain the tools to help them become leaders in developing disaster programs and managing EMS and disaster systems.

### **ACADEMICS**

In the academic arena there is a major focus on resident teaching and supervision. Specifically by the third year of residency training, emergency medicine residents at UT Medical Center are expected to supervise and manage medical students and junior residents in the Emergency Department, in the Simulation Lab and in Research activities.
